



Homework: You Shall Not Murder

Complete this sheet and bring it with you to class on November 7.

Read Luke 10, then answer the following questions about verses 25-37.

A lawyer approached Jesus with a question about eternal life in verse 25. Jesus ask him to summarize what the Law says about how to be saved. What answer does the lawyer give?

What would it look like if you kept this summary of the law perfectly?

Time to be honest: What percentage of time are you keeping this summary of the Law perfectly?

Not leaving well-enough alone, the lawyer decides to “justify himself” and asks Jesus to clarify Himself as to who your “neighbor” really is. Do you ever try to precisely define one of the Commandments of God so you can know how far you can go before you start breaking it? Is this good or bad? Why?

What was surprising about who **didn't** help the stranger? How about the one who **did** help? Read John 4:4-9 to understand the relationship between Jews and Samaritans.

A parable is a story that teaches a point. What point was Jesus trying to make with this parable?

How does the 5th Commandment (You shall not murder) relate to verses 36-37?

For in Scripture it says: “See, I lay a stone in Zion, a chosen and precious cornerstone, and the one who trusts in him will never be put to shame.” (1 Peter 2:6)
